# Telling a Story

- If you ever plan to share your photographs, then consider taking enough shots to tell a story
  - Every photograph you take does not have to be included in the showing
  - You can order the final story different than how they were originally taken
- Consider this example....

### Filling the Frame

- This is one 'hint' that can help create outstanding photographs
- No specific rule, but you will "know it when you see it"
- Empty space or cluttered space around your subject often leads to poorer compositions
  - Not always depending upon the particular goal of your photography

### Filling the Frame (con't)

- Assignment 1:
  - Choose a subject
  - Fill the frame
  - Look at the LCD display and try again filling the frame even more
  - Cropping off things in the subject, e.g. person's forehead, etc may create a "more creative" image.
  - Compare all your images
    - Which one do you like best-- Share it with the class

### Filling the Frame (con't)

- Assignment 2:
  - Shoot numbers or letters
  - Fill the frame
  - Make it a point to shoot only letters and numbers with great character and color
  - Share your best with the class
  - Remember to FILL THE FRAME

## Backgrounds

- We are used to worrying about 'backgrounds' in many parts of our life
  - Medical history
  - Job background checks
- Only in Photography and Love/Marriage do we skip the process!

## Backgrounds (con't)

- Amateur photographers are often so engrossed by what they see inside the viewfinder and by their passion for the main subject that they often miss problems with the background
  - TOO much clutter
  - TOO much detail
  - TOO bright or TOO dark
  - Jarring colors
  - Mergers
