"Created Equal: America's Civil Rights Struggle" Fall 2016

The "Created Equal Initiative" was created in 1963 by the National Endowment for the Humanities as a vehicle to mark the 150th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation. Part of its purpose is to "encourage members of communities to revisit the history of civil rights in America and to reflect on the ideals of freedom and equality that have helped bridge deep racial and cultural divides. "

The goals of this 8-week course are to discuss selected past civil rights events and compare/contrast them with present-day as well as projected future issues in society. The format will consist of exploratory questions, selected film clips, and guided discussions with the audience as major participants. Sessions will be facilitated by GMU professors, OLLI members, and representatives of community groups that contribute to promoting civil rights in the community, the state, and the nation.

Video content provided by the National Endowment for the Humanities resource will be "Created Equal: America's Civil Rights Struggle": The Abolitionists, Slavery by Another Name, The Loving Story, Freedom Riders and Freedom Summer. "Additional contributions are provided by the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History.

Coincidentally, this course will begin during the time frame of the official opening of the New African American History Museum on September 24, 2016 in Washington, D.C.
