1. On the Information Superhighway

Sign up early for this opportunity to take a test drive on the national information superhighway and learn about electronic communication via personal computer and modem.

The course is designed for those who are familiar with personal computers and who want to learn to use them for electronic mail (E-mail). You will get an introduction to the GMU AMason1@ computer information system, learn to send and receive electronic mail, and find out how to access information on the Internet, a kind of electronic highway.

Because much of the instruction will be hands-on at computer terminals, class size is limited to ten students for each two-week section.

To register for this course, you must provide your social security number on the Registration Form in order to obtain remote access to the GMU computer systems.

Allen Montecino says he is not a computer expert but is willing to serve as the friendly guide on this introductory trip to the world of E-mail, computer access to remote data bases and cyberspace.

Winkler Botanical Preserve

Wednesday, June 8, 10 am

This 43-acre area is surrounded by the concrete of Alexandria. With trees, wildflowers, a lake, waterfalls and ponds, the area is a horticultural museum.

River Farm

Wednesday, June 15, 10 am (\$4 fee collected at door)

This site near Mount Vernon is the home of the American Horticultural Society. It was one of George Washington's five farms, though he never resided there. River Farm is 27 acres of sweeping lawns with a striking view of the Potomac River, beautiful perennial borders, old plants from Washington's and Jefferson's day, and a children's garden. The tour will include the home and gardens. We will picnic, so bring a bag lunch; drinks and dessert will be provided.

Dumbarton Oaks

Wednesday, June 22, 10:30 am (\$5 entrance fee)

A docent will take our group on a tour of the formal gardens, and we will also visit the Pre-Columbian museum in a wing designed by Philip Johnson. This Georgetown estate, donated by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Woods Bliss, was the site of the 1944 conference that led to the founding of the United Nations.

Patricia Bennett Private Garden

Wednesday, June 29, 10:30 am

Pat will tell us about the work she is doing with hybrid lilies and show us her beautiful perennials and daylilies. Her garden is a national display for the American Hemerocallis Society and will be a national convention garden for the American Hosta Society in 1995.
