All About OLLI

Who We Are

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at George Mason University (GMU) offers daytime courses, lectures, special events and other activities during eight-week terms in the spring and fall, a four-week mid-winter term and a six-week summer program. There are no exams, no credits, no college degree required or offered and no age threshold. Making new friends is an important part of the OLLI concept. Social activities include luncheons and book clubs.

Course leaders are qualified members of OLLI and others who enjoy sharing their knowledge. Attracting well-known and knowledgeable persons from GMU, government, the diplomatic community and private organizations, OLLI is particularly proud of its volunteer teachers and speakers.

Members pay annual dues of \$280, which entitles them to attend as many activities as they wish, subject to availability of space. There may be charges for required books and materials and for some special events. OLLI offers partial and full scholarships for those in financial need; members are encouraged to contact the Site Administrator at Tallwood for details. Inquiries are kept strictly confidential.

OLLI publishes a weekly *OLLI E-NEWS* email newsletter, a printed *OLLI News* when classes are in session to keep members informed about the Institute, a catalog each term, a *Membership Directory* in the fall with an addendum in the spring and a *Member and Volunteer Handbook* for new members.

Most activities are held either at Tallwood, 4210 Roberts Road in Fairfax, or at the Washington Plaza Baptist Church at Lake Anne in Reston. OLLI's main office is at Tallwood, with a satellite office at the Lake Anne church (open only during class hours). Both sites are handicapped-accessible, and free parking is available. Maps and directions for all locations are printed on the inside back cover.

How to Join

1. International Medical Humanitarian Relief Work

Tuesday, June 20, 10:00–11:30

Talkwood

Instructor: Ian M. Shenk

Dr. Shenk has been performing overseas medical humanitarian relief work since 1993. His experiences as an international medical relief physician are multi-dimensional; he will share the dynamics and logistics of these activities. He will discuss the interaction of NGOs (non-governmental organizations) from around the world, the interaction of NGOs with the UN and large organizations like Médecins Sans Frontières. A significant focus will be his personal contact with unfortunate victims of humanitarian crises. Feelings about the social, political, economic and ethical dimensions of these situations will be briefly woven into the presentation. Dr. Shenk received his medical training at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. He has been in the private practice of medicine/gastroenterology in Fairfax for 35 years. His humanitarian medical relief work includes stints in Somalia, Rwanda, Mexico, Vietnam, Turkey, Afghanistan, Iraq, Liberia, Darfur/Sudan and Uganda.

2. Right Brain, Left Brain, Whole Brain: How Our Thinking Style Preferences Affect Our Lives

Whether we love to work with numbers, are incurably creative, or both, how we prefer to think has a major impact on how we communicate and how we live. In this session, we will analyze our own preferred thinking style, discuss how various thinking styles impact and interact with opposing and complementary styles and play a bit with our own thinking style preferences. While the discussion probably won't bring many surprises, there may be a few "ah ha's!" Dr. Reinhart has

worked with thinking style preference technology and the Hermann Brain Dominance Instrument for 25 years, applying the technology in organizations such as Merck Pharmaceuticals, the Veterans Administration, the Treasury Department and the Xerox Corporation to improve communications and performance.

4. Poetry Workshop

The Poetry Workshop, founded in 1991, is one of the earliest continuing courses offered by OLLI. The workshop auditions and critiques original poetry submitted by members of the group. It does not teach how to write poetry, nor does it focus on reading the work of well-known poets. Beginners as well as experienced poets are welcome. Emphasis is on encouraging the positive aspects of each poet's work and suggesting changes or corrections, if any, that might be made to improve the poem. Members are expected to bring to each of the four sessions either a new poem or a revised poem previously critiqued by the group. The "Poets of Tallwood" have published three volumes of original poetry and have presented readings for the past nine years. Some members have won prizes in poetry competitions and are published poets. Barbara Achilles is a published poet and has been a member of the OLLI Poetry Workshop for the past 14 years, serving as its moderator for the last seven years. She is a retired intelligence officer with a B.A. in music from the University of Rochester/Eastman School of Music.

He divides his time between his lovely wife of almost 40 years, grandchildren, being a docent at the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, amateur radio, writing computer software and digital photography.

6. Molière's Elegant Ridicule

In five sessions, we will explore Molière's comic genius, his life and his times. We will read, in detail, four of his plays in English translations by poet Richard Wilbur: *L'École des Femmes*, *Tartuffe*, *Les Femmes Savantes* and *Le Misanthrope*. A master of satire, Molière was hated by the proud, the pompous, liars, hypocrites and fops. He challenged the follies of both church and state, yet managed to resist attacks by both. He was not only a poet and playwright, but also a successful theatrical producer, director and principal actor. In the course of a performance of his play, *Le Malade Imaginaire (The Imaginary Invalid)*, he collapsed on stage and died within hours. As a master of irony, he must have enjoyed his fate. Books will be available for \$24. William Nicoson has written a play, which ventures that Molière did not author his masterpieces. Nicoson studied French theatre at the Sorbonne in Paris.

7. Is Long-Term Care Insurance a Smart Buy? Or Not?

This workshop will highlight issues to be considered in making intelligent decisions on the purchase of long-term care (LTC) products or services. Discussions include options relative to home care versus institutional care, emerging technology that eases care giving, open-market costs vs. contract price of services, contract obsolescence and changing government policy on universal coverage. Attendees will also learn about sales techniques designed to confuse decision-making, the misrepresentations in LTC insurance marketing about Medicare benefits, and how to analyze the content of nationally marketed policies through reading what is and is not covered in their outlines of coverage. A graduate of Roanoke College, V. Lee Cutler has a professional marketing background and experience as a long-term care giver/advocate.

9. Corps of Discovery II: Lewis and Clark Expedition Relived

September, 2006 marks the conclusion of the bicentennial commemoration of the travels of Meriwether Lewis and William Clark along the Missouri and Columbia Rivers to the Pacific Ocean. Envisioned by President Thomas Jefferson in 1803, the Corps of Volunteers for Northwest Discovery, under the direction of Captains Lewis and Clark, set out the following year in an epic journey that included innumerable hardships as well as encounters with North American peoples. The records of the expedition include the volunteers' observations about each new plant, animal and landscape feature they found and provide copious details about the state of nature more than two centuries ago. Fittingly, from 2003 through 2006 the National Park Service worked with other organizations to mark this bicentennial event. Come experience the expedition through the stories and recollections of Washington, D.C., park rangers who relived parts of the heroic journey either through research and work opportunities or as members of the historic Corps of Discovery II that followed in the footsteps of Lewis and Clark.

10. Oil: How the United States Can End Its Addiction

What should the United States do to overcome its addiction to oil? This lecture explains why oil is such a U.S. headache, details what the solutions

Odd-Even Bustnes is a principal at Rocky Mountain Institute, a non-profit organization focused on resource productivity. We will visit Homewood House, one of the finest surviving examples of Federal period architecture with 18th and early 19th century furnishings. Construction on it began in 1801 as a wedding present from Charles Carroll of Carrollton, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, for his son, Charles Carroll, Jr. The second home, Evergreen House, is a 48-room Italianate mansion filled with paintings, rare books, Tiffany glass, Japanese and Chinese collections and has Baltimore's only private theatre. Note: **Includes steps to enter each house and stairs to access the second floor of Evergreen. Please be prepared to stand or walk for 1-2 hours.** We will have a box lunch in Evergreen's Far East Room before we begin our tour of the house. Please select **one** of the following:

A. Rare Roast Beef with Muenster cheese, lettuce, tomato and onion with honey mustard on a Kaiser roll, potato salad, a brownie and fresh fruit.

After retiring, Mr. Wentworth joined Napier University in Edinburgh, Scotland, as a visiting professor of intelligent transport systems. He is currently a senior research scientist in the Center for Intelligent Systems Research at the George Washington University.

The instructor will guide the class in an exploration of the life and music of Franz Schubert, whose unbelievable melodic imagination poured itself out in a total of over 700 songs that were written during his short life. She will lead an in-depth analysis and discussion of Franz Schubert's music and German romanticism from the perspective of historical and musical background. She will talk specifically about how changes in post-1815 Europe affected his music. During the class, Miss Shamban will perform on the piano and sing. She grew up in a musical environment with two musician parents. She became fascinated with German songs, especially Schubert's, and has always had a penchant for Germany with its snowscapes and its centuries-old tradition of beautiful music. Miss Shamban is an accomplished pianist, who currently resides and gives concerts in Germany.

16. Journey of Man: Story of the Human Species

"*Journey of Man* answers the question: 'Where do we all come from?' Today, some six billion people are spread across the planet. This quote is taken from the DVD and accompanying book written by Dr. Spencer Wells, a leading geneticist and explorer. During this two-session course, we will watch the DVD of the excellent PBS presentation, which will demonstrate that tracing the DNA of our ancestors can lead to a better understanding of them and their origins. it. Abbie Edwards has had a life-long interest in religious tradition, has traveled extensively and has met peoples of other cultures around the world. She is an OLLI member and has taught numerous courses here.

21. Arnold Burns Richmond, 1780 The Ride of Jack Jouett, 1781

Wednesday, June 21, 10:00–11:30

Despite the move of the capital of Virginia to Richmond from Williamsburg in 1780 for greater safety from the British, Benedict Arnold led a force of 1,600 troops into Virginia and burned Richmond in December 1780. In June 1781 General Cornwallis ordered his “hunting leopard,” Lieutenant Colonel Banastre Tarleton, to ride to Charlottesville and capture Jefferson and the Virginia legislature, including many Revolutionary War leaders who were Virginia legislators, notably Patrick Henry, Richard Henry Lee, Thomas Nelson, Jr., and Benjamin Harrison. Virginia Militia Captain Jack Jouett made a spectacular overnight ride to Charlottesville to warn Jefferson and the legislature. Jouett’s ride is said to have changed the course of the American Revolution. Harold Davey has degrees from the Universities of Nebraska and Wisconsin. He served as a Foreign Service Officer and in the Bureau of International Labor Affairs, a division of the U.S. Department of Labor. This presentation is a History Club Highlight.

22. Ecology of Streams

Local streams can hold a wondrous diversity of life, but many streams are under regular assault by storm water runoff and other impacts. Our first class will be a slide presentation/lecture. The second will be a field trip to Pope’s Head Creek watershed in the Clifton area, one of the least developed in Fairfax County. We’ll discover how streams function as living systems and look at some of the remarkable creatures that dwell in their waters. We’ll also explore the concept of a watershed, examine the connection between local

streams and the Chesapeake Bay, consider how human activities affect the health of streams and look at some ways individuals can help protect streams. Cliff Fairweather is a staff naturalist with the Audubon Naturalist Society and has managed the Society’s water quality outreach, education and monitoring efforts in Northern Virginia for ten years. Laura Grape has worked for the Fairfax County Department of Public Works and Environmental Services for more than five years, monitoring the biological, chemical and physical characteristics of the county’s streams.

26. Ancient Roads of Syria and Jordan

Travel with us to Syria, Jordan and Lebanon for a view of some of the world’s most important and interesting archeological and historical locations, including Petra, Palmyra and the “Crac des Chevaliers,” a 12th century castle. Of special interest is Petra, an ancient oasis city in present-day Jordan. Lawrence of Arabia described it as “the eighth wonder of the ancient world.” Established more than 2,000 years ago to control the major

trade route between Arabia and Damascus, it is one of the best preserved and dramatic archeological sites in the world today. Take a camel ride with us, as we did in March 2006, through the narrow crevice leading to the hidden city, cliffs high on either side, and suddenly see the breathtaking view of the rose-colored Treasury and other Greco-Roman ruins. We will attempt to answer questions about travel to the area today and current conditions concerning safety and cultural and political changes. Dr. Springer is a professor emeritus at American University and has lived in and traveled to much of Asia and the Middle East. He teaches courses on the Silk Road at OLLI.

27. A Shenandoah Sampler: Plantation Life, Posh Dining and Professional Theatre

The unique limestone house, completed in 1797 for Major Isaac Hite and his wife, Nelly, sister of future President James Madison, has remained virtually unchanged. During the Civil War, Belle Grove was at the center of the decisive Battle of Cedar Creek. Today the plantation includes the main house and gardens, original outbuildings, a classic 1918 barn, an overseer’s house and the slave cemetery. From there we will travel to the Hotel Strasburg for a buffet lunch and then on to the Wayside Theatre for a 2:30 performance of *Are We There Yet?*, a musical by James Hindman, Ray Roderick and Cheryl Stern, with music by John Glaudini and Tom Kochan, lyrics by Yvonne Adrian. It takes a light look at a family road trip and that inevitable question, “Are we there yet?” It is a pastiche of the familiar, the hilarious and the touching moments that help us

28. Rereading Emily Dickinson in Her Own Books

Emily Dickinson, considered by most to be America's greatest woman poet, is one of the most original, complex and intriguing poets in the world. Generally, readers know her for her witty, brilliant individual lyric poems, but those poems have a context: many were also imbedded in letters and many more in her 40 little books, called "Fascicles" by her early editors. This class will trace some of the influences, familial, literary and cultural, on the developing poet and then will focus on the results of that influence: the poems as they appear in the books in which she placed them. Dr. Heginbotham, newly retired professor of English at Concordia University Saint Paul, completed research on Emily Dickinson that won the Bode Award for best American Literature dissertation (1992). She authored a book on Dickinson published by Ohio State University Press in 2002. She also chaired three major international literary conferences and was awarded a Fulbright Senior Scholar Award to teach at the University of Hong Kong (1998-99). She continues a busy schedule of teaching, writing and speaking, including teaching at the ILR on the campus of American University, while enjoying retirement with her husband, Erland Heginbotham.

29. How China and India Transform the Global Balance of Power

China and India have dramatically transformed the economic dynamics and balance of power in Asia and globally, especially since 2000. They have largely displaced Japan and the United States as the focus of Asian attention with regard to economic opportunities and regional leadership. With limited exceptions, the United States remains benignly absent and shunted aside from this process, in what one observer calls the most historic transformation since the rise of Europe and the United States. Along with India's development ambitions, three main drivers accelerate this process: China's urgent need to maintain high growth and employment, to assure regional stability and to preempt U.S. counter-hegemonic restraints and imposition of the U.S. agenda on the region. Erland Heginbotham teaches Asian Economic Development and Dynamics at the Johns Hopkins Graduate School of Advanced International Studies in Washington, D.C. He has held senior positions in the Department of State (Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for East Asia and Pacific Affairs), the Commerce Department, Senate Foreign Relations Committee, the U.S. International Trade Commission and the Overseas Private Investment Corporation.

30. Introduction to Maimonides

Hibernia, "Island of Saints and Scholars," "Cathleen N   Houlihan," "The Auld Sod," "England's Last Colony," "The old sow that eats her farrow," "Four Green Fields," "The Celtic Tiger." World travelers visit Ireland to savor the romance of its history, to follow in the footsteps of Swift or Joyce or to savor its sense of community, with its accents and music. Visitors leave enthusiastic about two things: the scenery and the people, the wild beauty of one and the hospitality and humor of the other. While Ireland is undergoing an economic and cultural transformation without precedent in its history, its charm and accessibility remain undisturbed by modernization. The inheritor of 5,000 years of history and 800 years of colonization, modern Ireland's culture is a complex (and still

contentious) mix of ethnic, linguistic, religious, and political allegiances. Between the remarkable cultural revival at its beginning and the burgeoning post-industrial economy, Ireland has gone from impoverished colony to European partner with a resounding bang. Dr. C  il  n Owens is a native of Ireland and has taught at George Mason for 30 years. For many of those years he was deeply engaged in Irish cultural programs in the Washington area. He has published books and scholarly articles on Irish drama, language and literature.

44. Troy: Legend and History

This lecture will examine the importance of Troy and the Trojan War to Western civilization. The story of the Trojan War forms the background of Homer's epics, *The Iliad* and *The Odyssey*, and has fired the imagination of writers and artists from antiquity to the present. We will be looking at the legendary Troy as depicted in myth and literature, as well as studying the archaeological evidence pointing to Troy as an important, historical city and trade center in the Bronze Age. Vera Wentworth holds a Ph.D. in English and has taught literature on the college level for 30 years. In addition to literature, her interests extend from Greek Bronze Age archaeology to the World War I German Navy. explore the Accotink Stream Valley. We are likely to encounter Neotropical migrants like wood thrushes, red-eyed vireos and Acadian flycatchers, as well as the resident barred owls. Carolyn Williams, a leader of weekly bird walks, will show you how to identify birds by sight and sound and teach you why stream valleys are important for migration routes and breeding habitats. The class will examine the negative effects of human activities on habitats and some ways in which we can help. Bring binoculars, water and a field guide (if you have one) and meet at the Eakin Community Park parking lot on Prosperity Avenue, halfway between Routes 50 and 236. Ms. Williams works part-time for the Audubon Society of Northern Virginia, and for the past 12 years has been the director of the Northern Virginia Bird Survey, an annual count of area breeding birds.

46. Middle East: Behind the Headlines

Why is the Middle East so unstable? What do Israelis and Palestinians think about their conflict? How have they reacted to recent events and to the resulting prospects for peace? Bill Kirby is a retired Foreign Service Officer who has spent 40 years dealing with the Middle East, particularly the Arab-Israeli conflict. In the State Department he served *inter alia* as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for the Middle East Peace Process. Overseas he served in Lebanon, Saudi Arabia, Bahrain and Israel.

47. Music in the Movies

48. *Paris 1919: Six Months that Changed the World*

The author artfully dissects the personalities of these world leaders—their strengths, foibles, ambitions—and how these traits influenced their deliberations. Many of the problems treated in 1919 influenced developments in the following decades and remain with us today. Phil True is an OLLI member, a member of the History Club and an instructor of courses on intelligence topics at OLLI. This presentation is a History Club Highlight.

The focus of Mr. Kavalier’s presentation will be orchid basics with an emphasis on ease of culture and how to make them work in a home environment. 53. The Triangle Shirtwaist Fire, 1911

Five minutes before the end of the work day on a beautiful Saturday afternoon in March 1911, a fire broke out on the eighth floor of the Asch Building, just one block off Washington Square in New York City. Had it started 15 minutes later, the fire would have been one of many that went relatively unnoticed in the largest city in the country.

Unfortunately, due to circumstances discussed in this talk, 146 workers died under tragic conditions in one of New York City's worst workplace disasters. 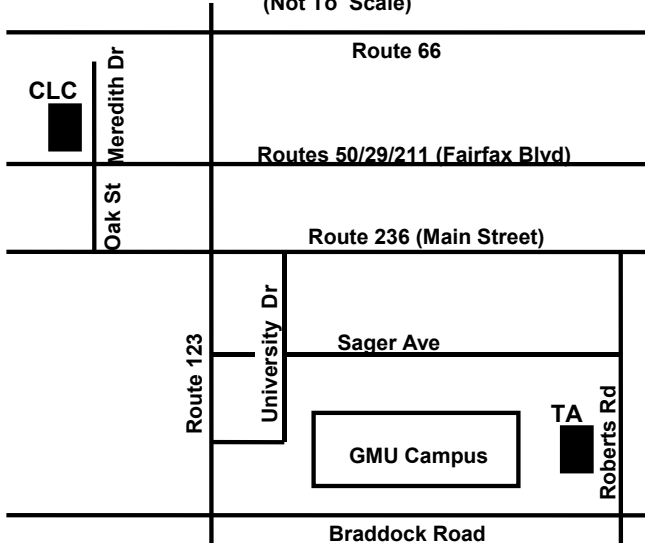

- **Tallwood (TA)** at 4210 Roberts Road can be accessed from Route 236 (Main Street) or Braddock Road. Parking is available in the lot in front of Tallwood and in the pool lot to the right (north) of Tallwood.

- **Christ Lutheran Church (CLC)** Christ Lutheran Church (CLC) at 3810 Meredith Drive can be accessed from Route 50 (now Fairfax Boulevard). Turn right onto Meredith Drive one-half mile west of the intersection of Routes 50 and 123. The church and parking lot are on the left.

- **Bus Trip Pickup** is from **Parking Lot No. 44** on the outside of the circular road in Fair Oaks Mall near Macy's. Fair Oaks Mall is at the intersection of Routes 66 & 50 in Fairfax and is accessible from Route 50 or West Ox Road (Route 608).

Directions to Lake Anne Locations

- **Washington Plaza Baptist Church, Reston Community Center, Reston Storefront Museum, and Reston Used Book Shop** are all located at the northern end of Lake Anne off North Shore Drive, which loops around most of the Lake. There are several entrances to North Shore Drive, but (unless you are a local resident) the best way is to enter at Village Road off Baron Cameron Avenue. Entrance signs read *Lake Anne Village Center*.

- Once on Village Road, turn almost immediately left onto North Shore Drive and then immediately right to enter the parking lot, where there is ample parking.

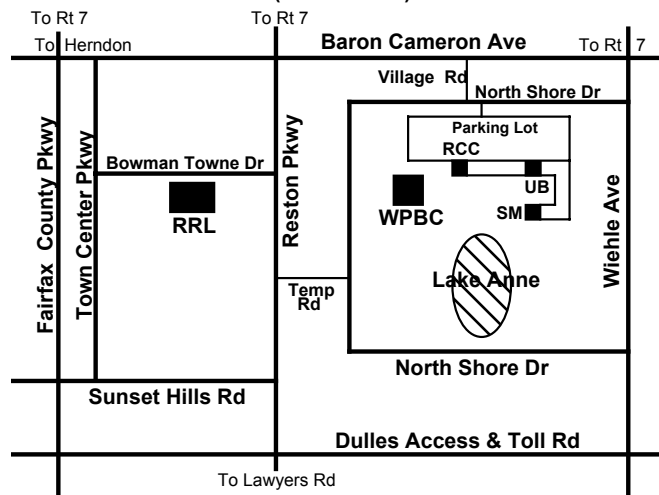
