New Election Procedures

We have new time frames and procedures this year for the election of new members to the Board of Directors. Voting begins by secret ballot at the Annual Meeting on May 9 at Tallwood and continues at Tallwood and Lake Anne during office hours until 11:30 a.m. on May 22, two days before the close of the spring term.

Mark your ballot with up to six Fairfax Ink. names, fold it into an envelope and seal the envelope, writing vour name and the date across the words in length. There are no reseal. Or you may mail your ballot to LRI, 4201 Roberts Rd., Fairfax, VA 22032-1028. Mailed bal- may submit as many stories as lots must be marked "Ballot" on the front of the envelope and must be received on or before the closing date and time of the voting period. A ballot received after the voting period or not enclosed in a sealed envelope marked with the voter's name and date is invalid. Also, more than one ballot from a member or more than one ballot in a sealed envelope will not be counted.

At the Annual Meeting the nominees will be introduced and asked to say a few words. Posterboards with their pictures and bios will be available at Tallwood fax, VA 22032-1028. and Lake Anne.

Shirley Fox, who died on February 23 after a brief illness, was one of the small group who got LRI started.
