Origin of the Word Caucus

The first *caucus* was probably held before this land of ours was discovered—certainly before it was colonized. The word comes from an Algonquin Indian word *cau-cau-a-su*, meaning "advisor." John Smith, in 1624, reported that the word was used in connection with powwows of Indian tribal leaders.

In the early 1700s, a back-stage political action group was organized in Boston and known as yhe Boston Caucus-club. By the time of the Revolution, the idea of political factions meeting in caucus to decide on candidates and campaign issues was well established, and *caucusing* remains a favorite political device to this day.
