OLLI Receives Second Osher Grant

I am very happy to report to you that OLLI has received a second \$100,000 grant from the Bernard Osher Foundation.

The foundation was very complimentary in their grant letter of our program and stated that ours "is a mature program which serves as a model for others — both locally and regionally and within the larger national Osher Institute network." We should be proud that we are looked on as one of the finest lifelong learning programs in the country.

This second year grant will be used primarily to hire an executive director. There are many reasons why the Board determined that this is the time to seek full time professional management of OLLI and we are grateful that the foundation has agreed to fund the position. The demands of our current operation have increased dramatically over the past few years. This, combined with the challenge of working with GMU to develop a future home for OLLI, far surpasses the ability of our volunteer Board and part time staff to handle effectively. An experienced executive director will provide continuity of leadership to our program and assure its ongoing high quality.

A search committee has been formed and we will keep you posted as the search progresses.
