The Program Committee is in the final stages of preparing the fall 2005 term. New classes feature several with multiple expert speakers: "A Hard Look at the Media" includes GMU professors as well as several media professionals including Bill Kristol; "The Great Divide: A Search for Civility and Inclusiveness" looks at the causes of polarization in our society and what we can do about it; "Global Warming" includes GMU professors and other scientific experts; "China in the 21st Century" explores China's culture, history, economy and future as a major world player; in "Northern Virginia 2015," professionals examine the future of our area, including economic drivers and transportation; "Entitlements and Healthcare" includes outside specialists who will look at the future, both short- and long-term, of Social Security and healthcare; GMU's performing arts department presents "Introduction to the Arts and Wellness;"; and "Immigration in a Post 9/11 World," includes representatives from federal immigration and enforcement services. Our GMUsponsored Music Sampler class will have a new twist this semester and will relate the music, literature, art and science of different periods.

Other new classes include "Heroes across Cultures and Times," by Amelia Rutledge of the GMU English Dept.; "War and Literature," by Leslie Smith of the GMU English Dept.; "Behind the Scenes at the Theater," by Judith Plummer; "Short Poems for Busy People," by OLLI member Mike McNamara; "Inexpensive Wines," by wine aficionado Eric Henderson; "Opera Spotlight on La Traviata and Romeo and Juliet"; "Science and Technology," by Jim Wentworth.

In Memoriam

Ellis A. Woody, 85, a founder and former board member of OLLI, died May 29, 2005. Mr. Woody was born in Tennessee, served in the Navy in World War II and worked for the FAA for most of his career. "Woody" served in many capacities at LRI: he helped write the first bylaws, taught courses, chaired the program committee and volunteered in many ways to make sure LRI prospered. He was a moving force in the growth of the program. His direct manner and sense of humor often carried the day at board meetings. OLLI owes a debt to Ellis Woody for the time and talents he gave in founding and developing the Institute into the successful organization we are today.
