LRI / GMU is not alone.

In the National Capital Area we are quite familiar with the network of associations. Well, Learning in Retirement Institutes have a national association: the Elderhostel Institute Network. The "elder" part is defined by each member organization. The "hostel" is an ancient word for an inn, a refuge for all those travelling the road of life.

The national Elderhostel Institute Network has about 100 member organizations. Each Institute is independent and unique to its community.

There is no model, but there are common ideals:

- -- university-level course work.
- -- membership under by-laws.
- -- member decision-making and involvement.
- -- participation by those who seek further learning without regard to their prior educational level.
- -- hospitality through social events and field trips.

How do we compare?

We have less than one years experience, but are already "above-average." Some LRIs don't have the members as teachers but hire them. For size at about 100 we are among the larger ones in the southeast U.S. where the program is newer than in New England. Institutes are generally affiliated with colleges and universities.


What is our potential?

For course content we can offer whatever interests the members; LRIs range widely from "how-to" to "why."

Thereisan LRI affiliated with American University in the District of Columbia with about 9 years experience, and a membership of about 400.

We are fortunate in having a large prospective population from which to attract members.

Fairfax County has one of the highest college and postgraduate educated populations in the nation. It also has a high income level for optional spending by the retired. In 1990 over 100,000 people in Fairfax County were age 55 and over; at the beginning of the next century there will be over 200,000.
