Think Ahead to Fall

Flowers are barely in bloom, but the Program Committee is already thinking about the courses to be offered in the fall term. Would you like to teach, moderate a panel or recommend a course or a teacher? Some special needs for the fall term include a native Spanish-speaking teacher, an additional course in history, and coverage of foreign policy or American government. A Change in Membership Fees

At its March 17 meeting the Board of Directors decided that half-year memberships would no longer be available beginning with the fall term. Though it was recognized that the half-year arrangement suited the travel arrangements and other scheduling of some members, statistics showed that few members chose the lower rate, and the lower fee added to the bookkeeping tasks. Another factor was the limited space available for classes, which may necessitate placing a ceiling on the total number of members that the Institute can accommodate. It was also noted that providing a full summer schedule is hampered by the unavailability of sufficient parking when the swimming pool lot is being used. The halfyear memberships at \$125 will therefore not be available after June 30, 1995.


News From the Network

Secretary of Defense Commends LRI Program

The winter semester program that Vince Boylan put together featuring 14 of our members as panelists was recognized by the Secretary of Defense as contributing to the nation-wide commemoration of World War II. LRI received a certificate designating our organization as a "Commemorative Community." The Department of Defense also provided

several training-aid posters and a flag bearing the commemorative eagle and the words "A Grateful Nation Remembers."

Each of the panelists shared her or his experiences during the war, and the variety provided a fascinating cross-section of war-time adventures. The U.S. Navy was represented by Shirley Hyland, Scott Palmer, Ellis Woody, Virginia Peters, Bill Cooley and Dick Finney. Army veterans participating were Elizabeth De Arment, Murray Minster, Vince Boylan and John Sullivan. Helen Lapitsky was a defense plant worker, and Marion Burgett was a USO volunteer. Marion Glazier served in the South Pacific with the American Red Cross, and Helene Layman had a civilian assignment in Military Intelligence.
