VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES AT GMU

George Mason University would like to have LRI members volunteer to help on three projects. This is a good opportunity for us to show our support and appreciation for all the University does for LRI.

- Help interview prospective freshmen. The University believes that admission should be based on more than test scores and grade point averages. From interviews you conduct, the admission counselors will gain insight into prospective students' commitment to learning, personal and academic maturity, creativity and communication skills. Student interviews will be held every Saturday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. from January 10 to April 25. As a volunteers you will be asked to devote at least three hours (more if you wish) on any Saturday of your choice, though the University would like volunteers to help one Saturday each in January, February and March. The University will provide training information and lunch. Call Mark Sistek, Associate Director of Admissions, to receive more information. His number is 993-2424.
- The GMU English Language Institute needs volunteers to help international students improve their English language competency. By talking with a group of four to six students, you will be helping them not only improve their English but also learn about life and customs in our country. The students are from Asia, Turkey, the Middle East and South America and are from 18 to 25 years old. They have completed the equivalent of high school and are eager to learn enough English to attend GMU or another U.S. university. Volunteers are asked to be available one hour per week for up to eight or ten weeks from February through April. All sessions with the students as well as training for LRI volunteers will be at the English Language Institute on campus. If you are interested in helping these students, call Kathy Trump, Director of the English Language Institute, to find out when training will be held. Her number is 993-3660.
- GMU is also looking for LRI volunteers to help tutor students on their writing assignments. To get more information on this program, call the Director of The Writing Center, Dr. Terri Zawacki, 993-1187.

New Century College hosts LRI

A panel of students discussed their academic focus, and Lilyan Spero presented a plaque to Jennifer Vernier, the recipient of the Abe Spero scholarship, which many LRI members contributed to.

Are you an LRI e-mail user?

George Mason University has installed new telephone lines and improved modems. The new phone number to connect to the new modems is (703) 426-2468.

The new modems provide computer access at speeds up to 33.6 Kbps. That is more than twice the speed of the old modems, and GMU plans a further upgrade to 56.6 Kbps soon.

This high-speed service for WWW and other computer communication is designed to work with a Point to Point (PPP) connection. If you have not converted your old TCPman connection to

the new PPP-type connection, you will not be able to take advantage of this new service. The University plans to phase out the old phone number (426-3536) and the old modem service as of February 2.

You won't have to buy any new software to reconfigure your computer, but you will have to establish a brand-new connection to GMU.

Instructions on how to install the new service on your computer can be obtained from printed handouts available at the UCIS Support Center in Thompson Hall on campus. You can also get instructions by directing your web browser to http://www.gmu.edu/departments/ucis/support/docs.html.

• M.Craig Beard, who will talk about "The FAA Today"


- Rudy Kapustin, who will discuss "The Role of the National Transportation Safety Board"

The Program Committee is busy planning for our spring programs and the committee members are very interested in your ideas and recommendations concerning a specific segment of the program..how we can best meet our member needs in the area of computer instruction.

As you may know, in the past we have attempted to provide our members with either classes or lab sessions on various topics related to computers. From the outset, it was not our objective to compete with the myriad of classes available through offerings at adult education classes, Northern Virginia Community College classes, etc.. Rather, it was our objective to provide basic introductory type classes in order for our members to become "Computer Literate". We have only a limited number of computers available and we have also been limited by the number of qualified instructors to conduct the classes. Neither of these limitations has changed to any degree over the past several years.
