Town Hall Meeting

The annual town hall meeting was held on Friday, November 6, at Tallwood. Jennifer Disano presented statistics about OLLI-Mason, including our record membership of 1,246.

The parking lot regrading at Tallwood will most likely begin next summer. Classes will be moved to Lord of Life and Church of the Good Shepherd. In addition to paying for this work, Mason will provide funds for replanting the garden that will be affected by the work.

The commemoration of our 25th anniversary in 2016 will include programs related to the theme "Living Well, Aging Well" and a special speaker series in collaboration with Mason. It will also include two parties: an all-OLLI party and volunteer celebration and a VIP party with area dignitaries and founding members. Members will be able to buy a book being written about the history of our OLLI.

Glenn Kamber discussed the work of the Board. In addition to placing a priority on preserving what members value about OLLI, we are also working to enhance our relationships with components of the university to make ourselves a firm asset to Mason. Included in this effort is becoming involved in Mason classes and mentoring as well as starting a scholarship for staff and families of the facilities department.

The meeting closed with a presentation by Jennifer Connors, Director of the Office of Military Services (OMS) at Mason. OMS has been chosen to receive our 25th anniversary gift to Mason. OMS does not receive programming funds from the university and so our gift will make a significant impact on their operations.

Dirty Knee Club

Anyone who visits OLLI's Tallwood campus is immediately struck by the beautiful grounds. The botanical canvas you see today is largely the brainchild of Valerie Braybrooke, chair of the Dirty Knee Club, who just released a book chronicling the evolution of Tallwood's landscape design.

Read the book and you will see that the Tallwood grounds have come a long, long way! In just 15 years, OLLI landscapers have completely transformed an unkempt property spotted with crumbling asphalt, wild shrubs, and old trees into a cornucopia of botanical delights—autumn ferns, bearded iris, creeping phlox, anemone, and heuchera dancing in a sea of nandinas, crepe myrtles, hydrangeas, and yews.

Landscaping at OLLI began with member Ray Solomon, who assembled a committee, collected money, and began taming Tallwood in 2001 with a few raised gardens and mowed lawns. Two years later, Valerie joined OLLI and was quickly co-opted to the committee because of her background in professional landscaping. She has led the committee ever since.

It has been a herculean task creating an OLLI oasis given the drainage and erosion challenges associated with the sloping terrain, and the incessant damage caused by deer, beetles, and winter salting. Nonetheless, Valerie and her dedicated team did their homework and found plants, designs, and hardscapes to withstand almost any challenge. The Dirty Knee Club was born!

Since then, the team has worked hard, with spectacular results. Tremendous thanks to Valerie and her wonderful team for the 12 inspiring gardens that grace our campus!

Spotlight on Volunteers: Liaisons

They're most visible before each class starts, when they make the announcements. If the instructor is an OLLI member, then that instructor performs liaison duties; if not, then an OLLI volunteer is asked to do the job. But it's not "just reading the announcements," as many people believe. Liaisons play an important role in improving the classroom experience and being sure that our non-OLLI-member instructors are happy to come back to teach again.

Liaison assignments are made around ten days before the beginning of each term, when members of the Liaison Subcommittee (part of Member Services) contact prospective liaisons in each class. In some cases, this is as simple as emailing someone who has thoughtfully checked "Yes" to the liaison question during online registration. In other cases, when no one has volunteered, the class rosters are scrutinized and potential liaison candidates are contacted until someone agrees to volunteer. Liaisons' jobs actually start about a week before class when they are given contact information for the instructor. One of the behind-the-scenes, but most important, tasks to be completed is to make sure the instructor is aware that the class is starting soon, and to ask if they have any specific needs.

As liaison, Michelle Blandburg can testify, this pre-term phone call can avert a disaster: she once contacted a new instructor and discovered that he thought all of his classes had been cancelled, when only some of them had been. He also didn't know where Tallwood was. Michelle stayed in touch with him and saved the day; otherwise we might have had a classroom full of puzzled and disappointed OLLI members. Liaisons also help the instructor immediately before each class, providing water, distributing hand-outs, reminding them of class ending times, and doing whatever it takes to make the class as good as it can possibly be. They also take a head count during the class, and jot the number on the roster so that the office staff will have more information for planning future classes.

The number of people who have said "Yes" to being liaison over the years is countless. Some are even willing to serve for more than one
