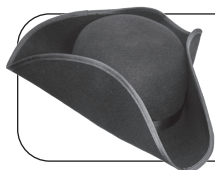
End the week at Casa Artusi in Forlimpopoli — the living museum and culinary school dedicated to the man who invented Italian national cuisine.

Who We Are

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at George Mason University (OLLI Mason) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization affiliated with George Mason University and the national Osher Lifelong Learning network that provides classes, lectures, trips, clubs, social and other activities for over 1000 active learners age 50+. Over 500 college-level courses and activities covering a broad range of subjects are offered each year. Programs are presented in-person at the Fairfax campus, at satellite sites throughout Fairfax County, and online.

OLLI Mason programs and activities are developed, managed, and produced through the combined effort of member volunteers and OLLI Mason staff. Classes are taught by GMU professors, experts from the community, as well as the members themselves, many of whom are highly credentialed and experienced instructors during eight-week terms in the spring and fall, a four-week winter term, and a six-week summer term. There are no exams or credits. Members pay dues and may attend as many classes and activities as they wish, subject to space availability. There may be charges for materials or for some special events.

OLLI Mason's mission is to provide intellectual and cultural experiences in a welcoming atmosphere that promotes lifelong learning.

Each session, held in Tephra ICA's main gallery or satellite space at Tephra ICA at Signature, will focus on just one or two works from the current exhibitions. Through conversation and facilitation, participants will explore how color, form, and material can spark memory, curiosity, and connection—without needing prior art knowledge. Together, we'll reflect on how contemporary artists raise questions, challenge assumptions, and invite new ways of seeing. Sessions will connect looking to broader ideas around art, culture, and philosophy, offering a springboard for continued personal exploration beyond the gallery walls.

Phoebe Avery is advancement officer at Tephra ICA, leading fundraising initiatives with a deep background in visual arts. Michelle Hand, Ph.D., is an assistant professor of Social Work at George Mason University. Her research focuses on nonpharmacological strategies to address sexual violence and trauma across the lifespan among at-risk community members, particularly in later life, using nature and arts-based approaches.

Through iconic scenes and soundtracks, we'll uncover how scores and songs work together to drive narrative, define character, and capture cultural moments. From the groundbreaking *The Jazz Singer* (1927) to modern classics, we trace the evolution of film music and spotlight legendary composers. These include Max Steiner, Bernard Herrmann, Elmer Bernstein, Henry Mancini, Justin Hurwitz, John Williams, Miles Davis, Lalo Schiffrin, and Quincy Jones—spanning classic Hollywood to today across drama, romance, comedy, adventure, and film noir. We close with a special focus on film noir and the unmistakable role of jazz in shaping mood, tension, and cinematic cool.

Mike Agron is a music aficionado raised in LA's entertainment scene and who now lives in Sacramento, CA. He's a former high-tech executive and entrepreneur turned storyteller. Mike creates engaging multimedia seminars on music and film and has led hundreds of seminars for the Sacramento Renaissance Society, multiple OLLIs nationwide and Osher Online. Richard Wagner was one of the most influential and controversial composers who ever lived. He created operas of immense drama, beauty, and emotional power; revolutionized classical music; and helped shape the sound of modern film scores. While some people assume Wagner's operas are long, heavy, or difficult; his music can be thrilling, moving, and surprisingly accessible. This talk offers a lively and entertaining introduction to Wagner's remarkable life and career, featuring numerous performance excerpts from his operas. Along the way, it will explore his larger-than-life personality, his groundbreaking musical ideas, and the lasting impact of his work on music, movies, and culture. Whether you

are completely new to Wagner or already a fan, this presentation will provide fresh insights into one of history's most fascinating musical figures.

Dan Sherman is an economist who lives in Alexandria and has been in the Washington area since earning his Doctorate from Cornell in 1985. Since 2010, Dan has taught courses to many groups on opera, musical theatre, and film. One of his first classes was on Wagner, which he taught at OLLI Mason in 2010.

113F "Is This a Book?" Exploring and Creating Artists' Books with George Mason Libraries' Special Collections Research Center

Artists' books can be defined broadly as artworks that use the form of the book as their medium. These works exist in the territory of printmaking, papermaking, conceptual art, poetry, and publishing. The content and form of artists' books are intrinsically linked, allowing them to communicate ideas on multiple levels while engaging tactile and visual elements like typography, binding, and material. In this joint presentation and workshop, participants will be introduced to the history and contemporary practice of artists' books and book arts, using materials drawn from the libraries' Special Collections Research Center. Following the presentation, participants will learn about and create a simple book structure, providing them with the tools to begin exploring their own book arts projects.

Stephanie Grimm is the Art and Exhibitions librarian and Book Arts curator for Mason Libraries, where she supports teaching and research in the Special Collections Research Center. She holds a Master's in Preservation from the University of Michigan (MSI) and an MA in Art History from GMU.

The Investment Forum, which has been meeting continuously since 1995, addresses investment topics of particular interest to retirees. A weekly agenda is distributed, and sessions begin with an open discussion of recent events in the economy and financial markets, and their impact on investment decisions. Member presentations and discussions typically include such topics as: recent market indicators, stocks, bonds, mutual and exchange traded funds, real estate investment trusts, sector allocations, investment strategies, portfolio management, and choosing advisory services. Each week members may participate in our "Buy/Sell/Thinking-About" segment by sharing their investment trades or activities of the previous week, which are then looked at and discussed in a peer group setting. The Forum typically uses various Wall Street analyses and data, as well as relevant news from the financial press. In addition, we regularly incorporate a number of online financial tools and websites in looking at members' recent trading activities or other investment products.

Several years ago, GMU created a Student Managed

Investment Fund (SMIF). This is an equity only fund managed by students. Members present their research to the student finance committee for voting to decide what stocks to buy or sell. The instructor (professor and fund advisor) will moderate each session selecting his best students to share their investment ideas with OLLI members.

Derek Horstmeyer is a professor of Finance at George Mason University's School of Business, specializing in corporate finance. His research focuses on boards, ETF and mutual fund performance, and hedge fund activism. Dr. Horstmeyer also writes a monthly column for the *Wall Street Journal* on cutting-edge research in finance, and his work has been cited in *Forbes*, *Bloomberg*, *CNBC*, *Fortune*, *PBS NewsHour*, the *New York Post*, *USA Today*, *CNN*, *The Washington Post*, the *LA Times*, and many other outlets. He helped create and lead the first student-managed investment fund at GMU.

The instructors will share their experience with estate planning and retirement living with seniors and their families. Their purpose is to educate seniors about ways to become proactive in planning their estates: 1) An overview of estate planning: a look at the taxes, laws, and issues that surround estates and how the documents we use help us to prepare for incapacity and death; 2) Trusts: we will look at what trusts are and how they serve us, both before and after death; 3) Funding your living trust: this session will be about the process for transferring (“funding”) various types of assets into a living trust; 4) Medical decision making and advance health care directives: a look at preparing for a time when we are unable to make our own medical decisions.

Dina Shaar is an attorney who brings a decade of experience to her work in estate planning. A graduate of George Mason University, she earned her undergraduate degree in Criminology, Law, and Society in 2021, followed by her Juris Doctor from Mason Law School in 2024.

Sarah Parks is an attorney who limits her practice to estate planning. She founded Custom Estate Planning, which she has been operating since 1995. She has a JD degree from the Mason School of Law and an LLM from the Georgetown University Law Center.

206F / 206Z Economic Current Events and Their Effect on You

This class will focus on but not be limited to: 1) Immigration: what are the benefits and what are the costs?; 2) International Trade and Industrial Policy: who benefits from trade and who loses?; 3) Growing inequality in income and wealth: is it necessarily a bad thing?; 4) The economic impact of increasing federal debt; 5) Financing the costs of higher education: would canceling student

debt help increase access to higher education?; 6) Social Security and MEDICARE: how will the looming huge deficits in these trust funds affect you; e.g., cuts in benefits, raises in taxes, or a combination of both?; 7) Inflation and disinflation: its causes and effects and the policies needed to moderate it. Students will have the opportunity to suggest other topics, for example, artificial intelligence and labor markets, energy policies, etc.

Elliott Dubin was the director of Policy Research at the Multistate Tax Commission. He was a member of the VA Commonwealth Savers (529) Plan; and, is currently the treasurer of the not-for-profit Hartwood Foundation.

207F Direct Indexing: Does It Make Sense for You?

One session

Monday, 9:40–11:05, Sept. 28

Class limit: 40

This course introduces direct indexing as a modern approach to market investing that is especially relevant for investors age 55 and older who are increasingly focused on taxes, flexibility, and real-world outcomes. Participants will learn how direct indexing differs from traditional index mutual funds and ETFs by allowing investors to own individual stocks, customize holdings, and manage taxes more deliberately, particularly in taxable accounts. Through plain-language explanations, relatable retirement-focused examples, and guided discussion, the course explores how direct indexing works, when it may be beneficial, and what trade-offs it involves, including tracking differences, complexity, and behavioral discipline. Rather than promoting direct indexing as “better,” the course emphasizes thoughtful decision-making, helping participants understand whether and how this strategy might fit into a broader, long-term financial plan focused on after-tax wealth and personal goals.

Michael P. Egan, CFP®, is a founding partner of Egan, Berger & Weiner, LLC. with over 30 years of experience in the financial services industry as a mutual fund analyst, accountant, and financial planner. He graduated from George Washington University with a degree in Finance.

301F History vs. Fiction: The Dilemma of Ordinary People in Hitler's Germany

Three sessions

Instructor: David Wessel

Mondays, 11:50–1:15, Sept. 21–Oct. 5

This course will consider the dilemma of ordinary people in 1930s Germany. How much did ordinary people know about what was going on? What could they choose to do about it? What, if anything, did they do? We'll explore how historical texts and documentaries over the last ninety years have portrayed the response of ordinary Germans to Hitler's ascendancy. Did they flee the country or stay to resist the Nazi Party? Did they accept the changes with which they were faced and comply with the Party's policies? Or did they actively support the rise of the Third Reich? We'll contrast how their reactions have been viewed by historians and how they have been portrayed in historical novels and on the screen.

David K. Wessel, the son of a German immigrant, is a retired U.S. diplomat turned historian and author, who has studied inter-war Germany for over fifty years. His first novel, *Choosing Sides* (2024), is the award-winning story of an ordinary family (his own) torn apart by Hitler's Germany.

302R Caesar Augustus and Rome's Transition to Autocracy

In the late first century BCE, the ancient Roman state underwent a dramatic transition from a Republic in which power was shared and distributed through the state to a de facto autocracy under the emperors. This class will explore how the first emperor, the man we know as Augustus, achieved this transition and established a state that would endure for centuries. We will consider not only how the Augustan regime continued certain aspects of the Republican system, but also decisively broke from it. We will then look at how the system fared over the roughly two centuries after Augustus' death in 14 CE.

David Timko holds an M.A. degree in Ancient History from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He taught his first class with OLLI in fall 2025.

303F *The Unlikely War Hero: The Incredible Vietnam War Story of Navy Seaman Apprentice Doug Hegdahl*

This presentation is based on the instructor's 2024 book, *The Unlikely War Hero*, a slice-of-life biography of the

Vietnam War story of Doug Hegdahl, the youngest and lowest-ranking American captured in North Vietnam and held in the infamous Hanoi Hilton. The 20-year-old seaman apprentice serving aboard the *USS Canberra* fell off the ship in the Tonkin Gulf in the early morning hours of April 6, 1967. He managed to survive for at least three hours in the China Sea, then was picked up by a North Vietnamese fishing boat and taken to the Hanoi Hilton. He went on to make Vietnam War history. Calling it “a strange, fascinating, and ultimately powerful account of one man’s endurance of life as a POW during the American war in Vietnam,” Tim O’Brien called the book “one of the finest nonfiction narratives to emerge from the Vietnam War.”

A former staff writer for *Congressional Quarterly*, **Marc Leepson** is a journalist, historian, and the author of 11 books, including *Saving Monticello* and biographies of the Marquis de Lafayette, Francis Scott Key, and Army Sgt. Barry Sadler. He served two years in the Army, including in the Vietnam War. The arts editor, senior writer, and columnist for *The VVA Veteran*, he taught U.S. History at Laurel Ridge Community College from 2008-15.

304R / 304Z The Mexican American War 1846-1848

The Mexican American War is America’s forgotten war. There is no monument to the war in Washington, D.C. There is no course on the war at George Mason University. However, this war resulted in a huge transfer of land to the U.S. which changed our map and our history. In this class, we will discuss the following topics: the political, social, economic, cultural, and religious situations in the U.S. and in Mexico in the first half of the 1800s; the reasons for the war; the military history of the war in Mexico, New Mexico, and California; and the unusual circumstances around the treaty that ended the war, the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo.

Philip Massey is a former radiologist with an interest in American history. He has given five OLLI classes on Civil War subjects.

Jane Welborn Spurgin was a patriotic supporter of the American Revolution who welcomed the Continental Army general Nathaneal Greene to her North Carolina home. Jane’s husband, William, was a Tory whose loyalist militia unit would soon engage Greene’s army in battle at Guilford Courthouse. After the war, Jane remained in North Carolina while William fled to Canada. Most historians see the American Revolution as a brutal civil war that divided communities and even families. In the Spurgins’ case, the war that ended their marriage also nearly left their large

family homeless. But the resilient Jane fought to reclaim the disgraced William’s confiscated property as her own. In the process, she claimed the rights of citizenship—an unusual, even radical, claim for a woman of her era.

Cynthia Kierner is a professor of History at George Mason University, where she teaches courses on early America, women and gender, and disasters in history. Her most recent book, *The Tory’s Wife*, was a finalist for the George Washington Book Prize and winner of the Julia Cherry Spruill Prize from the Southern Association for Women Historians.

306F More Walk, Less Talk: How a Japanese Immigrant Helped Create the Appalachian Trail and Great Smoky Mountains National Park

George Masa was a Japanese immigrant who saw the Southern Appalachians with unusual clarity—and then did the work, alongside others, to help protect them. Through his photography and meticulous mapping, he helped make the case for what would become Great Smoky Mountains National Park and played a quiet but essential role in shaping the early Appalachian Trail. This presentation explores Masa’s life and the conditions under which he worked—often in difficult terrain, carrying heavy equipment into remote places. Drawing on historical research, contemporary photography, and selections from George Mason University Library’s Masa collection, the session connects his legacy to the work of conservation today. It asks a simple question: what does it look like, in any era, to truly see a place—and take responsibility for it?

David Huff is founder of the George Masa Foundation, a photographer, and a trail maintainer on the Appalachian Trail. His work focuses on conservation, storytelling, and leadership, helping connect people more deeply to the natural world.

308Z Fall for the Book: *Fuji Fire: Sifting Ashes of a Forgotten U. S. Marine Corps Tragedy*

In *Fuji Fire: Sifting Ashes of a Forgotten U. S. Marine Corps Tragedy*, journalist and decorated Marine veteran Chas Henry brings the story of the largest peacetime disaster into focus. On the slopes of Mount Fuji in October 1979, the most intense tropical cyclone ever recorded propelled 5,500 gallons of gasoline into corrugated steel huts housing U.S. Marines, injuring sixty people and killing thirteen. Author Ralph Peters says this thoroughly-researched book “[portrays] victories of the human spirit, immense sacrifice, inspiring camaraderie, and personal transcendence. Impeccably researched, skillfully written... Chas Henry has written a fine book and created a worthy memorial to the living and the lost.”

Chas Henry served as an active-duty Marine from 1976-1996, rising in rank from private to captain. He was decorated for his actions during the 1991 Gulf War. Journalistic assignments over the years have taken him to more than 30 nations on five continents. He is the author of *Fuji Fire*.

The instructor will discuss his new book, *The Forgotten World War: Exploring the Secret History of the American Revolution, from Spain to India and Back Again*. In it, Baxter tells the story of the revolution as a vast war fought across four continents, showing how deeply interconnected America’s story was with events across the globe. He traveled in person to many of the places where the war was fought. In the book, he journeys to an island in the English Channel, a jungle in the Yucatán, the fortress of Gibraltar, a palace in India, and many other surprising sites where allies took on the British, their common foe. *The Forgotten World War* demonstrates how France, Spain, the Dutch, the Oneida Indian nation, enslaved and free African Americans, and the Mysore Kingdom all



contributed to the struggle for American independence. It expands the conversation around America’s founding. The book invites audiences to reconsider independence as interdependence from the beginning.

Derek Baxter is a Fairfax native. He has written two books: *In Pursuit of Jefferson: Traveling through Europe with the Most Perplexing Founding Father* and *The Forgotten World War: Exploring the Secret History of the American Revolution, from Spain to India and Back Again*.

311F USS Houston CA-30/POW Experience

This delivery will cover the story of the *USS Houston CA-30*, a brave American warship that served in the Asia West Pacific during the early months of WWII. It continues to chronicle the remainder of the war for the modest number of her survivors (ship sunk 03/01/1942), who were held as POWs by the Japanese. Most of those men were forced into labor by their captors helping to build the “Burma-Thailand Death Railway”. That railway was featured in the 1957 epic war movie titled, *Bridge on the River Kwai*. Herein, the true saga of that ordeal will be offered.

John K. Schwarz has been familiar with this story for a lifetime as the son of one of the *USS Houston CA-30* survivors. He is a retired government worker and also a certified school teacher. He appreciates veterans and their service to America.

312F Mason Oral History: Revolutionary Conversations: Exploring the Values of the American Revolution through Intergenerational Conversation

A general Q&A will follow the initial discussion. This event is part of the OLLI Oral History program, with the plan that this be recorded as part of the Special Collections Research Center’s work documenting the history of George Mason University and OLLI. George Oberle is director of the Center for Mason Legacies and is a history librarian. He received his Ph.D. in History from George Mason University and pursues research interests including the significance of knowledge creation and dissemination. His book, *Creating an Informed Citizenry: Knowledge and Democracy in the*



Early American Republic (University of Virginia Press) examines early debates in the United States over how best to educate the constituents of the new nation.

313Z The Soviet/German War: One Historian's 50-year Study of Evolving Interpretations and Source Materials

This course reviews the presenter's experiences in studying and researching the Soviet/German War of 1941–45, the largest and costliest land campaign of World War II. We will review the changing interpretations of that conflict over the past 50 years, especially with regard to the increased access to available source materials. Our class will thereby consider aspects of both the military campaign and subsequent controversies among historians. In so doing we may better understand the background to the breakup of the Soviet Union and the current Russian/Ukrainian war.

Timothy Mulligan earned his Master's and Ph.D. in History at the University of Maryland. For 34 years he served as an archivist at the National Archives and Records Administration, specializing in American military and captured German records. He is the author of three books and over 20 articles.

314F / 314Z The New Imperial Presidency

This course concludes the Imperial Presidency course given in previous terms. We'll examine how Presidents George W. Bush and Barack Obama used national emergencies to claw back power from Congress. President Bush utilized the emergency resulting from the terrorist attack on 9/11 as justification to reassert presidential power. The reassertion of presidential power has been dubbed the "New Imperial Presidency." President Obama continued to claw back authority from Congress based on national emergencies.

Michael McGregor currently works as a policy analyst at the Department of Health and Human Services. His research has focused on the history of the U.S. presidency, Franklin Roosevelt, Congress, and the Lend-Lease Act. Michael received his Master of Arts from George Mason in 2002.

315F / 315Z Continuity and Change in U.S. Foreign Policy

This lecture and discussion course examines critically the theory that U.S. foreign policy has swung like a pendulum during the 250 years of our nation's existence. Zachary Teich was a foreign service officer from 1979 to 2006. He

served overseas in Guatemala City, Quito, London, Canberra, and Antananarivo. He was a negotiator/program manager at the State Department's Nonproliferation and Disarmament Fund (2006–12). He has Master's degrees from Georgetown University and the USMC War College.

316F Religion and the American Experiment

English author G.K. Chesterton once described America as "a nation with the soul of a church." Other Europeans commented that while American religion was less bland than its cuisine, it was just as baneful. In this course, we will survey the history of religion in America, that is, in the geographic region that became the United States. We will discuss Puritanism and its encounter with the New World; religion and the American founding; Catholics, Mormons, and Jews, and movements against them; and the rise and fall and rise again of the Religious Right.

John G. Turner is professor of Religious Studies and History at George Mason University and chairs the Department of Religious Studies. He writes broadly about the intersection of religion and U.S. history including a history of Plymouth Colony and biographies of Joseph Smith and Brigham Young. Most recently, he authored *Joseph Smith: The Rise and Fall of an American Prophet*.

317F / 317Z The Civil War Beyond the Battles, Part III

Wednesdays, 9:40–11:05, Oct. 21–Nov. 4

Each of the lectures covers a different aspect of the American Civil War. We will avoid the usual focus on military campaigns or individual battles in favor of topics tangentially related to the fighting but rarely covered in the usual survey course.

- **Civil War Technology** analyzes some of the technological advances stimulated by the war, which also had a significant impact on the outcome.
- **The Great Locomotive Chase** recounts the daring, but ultimately unsuccessful, Union attempt to steal a Confederate train and the subsequent awarding of the first Medals of Honor to those brave soldiers.
- **Christmas During the Civil War** will discuss the ways Christmas was observed by both sides and how the war changed the celebration of the holiday in America.

Jim Anderson spent three years in the Air Force and 27 years with the CIA. He has an MA in History from the University of Memphis. His retirement leadership training business featured Civil War battlefield seminars. He has been an instructor and tour guide at OLLI since 2009, focusing on American history.

How important is the right to vote in America and to know that one's vote is meaningful? Those are questions that have intrigued historians for many generations. And yet, this basic right is not embedded within the original Constitution of the United States. Instead, it was addressed only by the states and in eight subsequent amendments to the federal Constitution, telling us how very fundamental it actually is in the exercise of citizenship. How voting rights were perceived by the Founding Fathers before, during, and after the Constitution's establishment, especially how the first of those eight amendments—the 12th and that unusual animal called the Electoral College—has worked and evolved over the last two-plus centuries will be the course's focus.

David Cain is a Fairfax County election officer (since 2022), and is a former intelligence officer in the U.S. government, including six years as an instructor-course manager. He has BA (History) and MA (Political Science) degrees from Ohio University.



320F / 320Z The British Side of the American Revolution

British historian Robert Harvey speaks of a "creation myth" in which Americans spun their own version of the American Revolution by use of exaggeration and misinformation. Is Harvey correct? In truth, have we ever questioned the motives of the American patriots or such American heroes as John Hancock and Samuel Adams? Have we ever wondered why at least a third of the colonists remained loyal to the Crown? Are we aware that a significant number of slaves and Native Americans fought on the side of the British—and had good reasons for doing so? And what exactly happened at Yorktown? Was it as straightforward as we have thought? In these sessions we will experience the American Revolution from a different perspective. More than one surprise is in store.

Beth Lambert has been an OLLI member since 2008 and is professor emerita of English at Gettysburg College. She published and taught courses on all aspects of the 18th century Britain. Her biography of Edmund Burke was published by the University of Delaware Press.



321F The Rescue of Mount Vernon

Learn about how George Washington's home was purchased by women who wanted to preserve it, when neither the U.S. Congress nor the State of Virginia wanted the mansion. The Ladies of the Mount Vernon Association organized to purchase the mansion and property. The task was not easy, as many did not believe women were



capable of managing and preserving the mansion. The women's mission was to restore George Washington's home to the time period when he lived there. During the Civil War, the mansion was opened to Union soldiers to visit. The women's efforts have made Mount Vernon one of the most visited historic sites in Virginia.

Mary Lipsey is a retired middle school American History teacher. She taught at Lake Braddock Secondary School for almost 30 years. She was a volunteer docent at the Smithsonian American History Museum and the National Archives. She has authored books on aviation and American women's history.

322Z 1776: A Tale of Two Worlds: George Washington's America and Qing China

What was happening in China when George Washington led the American colonies toward independence? This session will be a fresh, accessible global perspective on the year of America's founding.

Dawn Li, Ph.D., a native Chinese speaker with a Doctorate in Language and Literature, has taught Chinese culture at George Washington University and English at Peking University in Beijing. She is the author of *New Dao Fables: Wisdom of the Wild* (animal stories) and *Song of a Lotus Leaf* (poems).



323Z Oh, the Stories I've Heard

This veteran journalist offers tales from the field after 40-plus years as a broadcast producer and reporter. Learn what she gleaned when producing interviews with U.S. presidents from Jimmy Carter to Barack Obama. Hear her talk about the high stress yet rewarding environment of a fast-paced newsroom including what it was like to be on the news desk on September 11, 2001. Find out about the most challenging assignments, the ones that worked, the ones that did not, and those that were the most fun. Understand how creating a documentary differs from daily news gathering. See what happens when a behind-the-scenes producer makes her on-camera debut on national television at age 60. And discover how mementos from long-ago interviews led to an appearance on PBS's *Antiques Roadshow*. McCleery will use anecdotes, photographs, and video to illustrate her presentation.

Kathleen McCleery is an award-winning broadcast journalist who was deputy executive producer for *PBS NewsHour* for eight years. She's also reported and produced stories for the program from NM. Kathleen taught journalism at Princeton University in 2016 and 2018, focusing on media coverage of elections.

325Z History for Travelers: Etruscans, Romans, and the High Middle Ages

Three sessions

Thursdays, 9:40–11:05, Oct. 8–22

This course explores three extraordinary Italian sites – the Monterozzi Necropolis in Tarquinia, Hadrian's Villa in Tivoli, and the medieval city of Siena – as gateways into three civilizations that profoundly shaped the Western world: the Etruscans, the Romans, and the society of the High Middle Ages. Through their art, architecture, and historical legacy, we will trace the cultural evolution of Italy from antiquity to the medieval era.

404F Staging England's Story: Shakespeare's Major History Plays

Eight sessions

Instructor: Susan McCloskey

Tuesdays, 9:40–11:05, Sept. 22–Nov. 10

Through the experience of three kings, Shakespeare traced England's passage from the medieval to the early modern world. One king tragically misunderstood the exercise of power; the second usurped the crown and unleashed civil war; the third abandoned his riotous youth to become the greatest of the Lancastrian kings. We will read the plays that tell this story: *Richard II*, *Henry IV* (Parts 1 and 2), and *Henry V*, spending two sessions on each. Separately and together, these plays raise complex questions about power, politics, and leadership. As we grapple with them, we'll look at Shakespeare's creation of characters who embody the competing forces that a successful ruler must harness. We'll investigate the dramatic and theatrical resources Shakespeare employed to give each play its distinctive sound and feel. We'll also consider whether his exploration of political, moral, and social upheaval lets us see in the world of these plays an image of our own.

Susan McCloskey received her Ph.D. in English Literature from Princeton University, taught at Vassar College, and spent a memorable year as the dramaturg for the Classic Stage Company in New York City.

405Z Charles Dickens's *Bleak House*

In this class we'll read Dickens's masterpiece from a variety of perspectives: we'll contextualize it with his life, career as a wildly comic-melodramatic reformist author, editor/publisher of weekly highly influential magazines, *Household Words* and *All the Year Round*; the development of the new genre of mystery-detective fiction and his friendship with Wilkie Collins, a fellow practitioner. We'll consider it as a novel published in installments and from the point of view of Phiz's illustrations. We'll read two short stories: the ghost-gothics *Signalman* and *Haunted Man*. There are two film adaptations, BBCs serials 1985 (Arthur Hopcraft, Diana Rigg, Denholm Elliot) and 2005 (Andrew Davies, Anna Maxwell Martin, Alun Armstrong), one of which you'll be encouraged to watch as they enrich our experience of the book and make it more enjoyable.

Ellen Moody taught for in senior colleges from 1972-2011 and now over 12 years at two OLLIs. She is a published scholar with specialties in British literature, film, and women's studies. Her most recent publications and talks have been about Anthony Trollope, Jane Austen, and 18th century literature.

411Z "Such Friends": James Joyce, Sylvia Beach and *Ulysses*

In Paris in the 1920s, James Joyce could find no publisher to bring out his scandalous novel, *Ulysses*. A New Jersey preacher's kid, Sylvia Beach, and her bookstore, Shakespeare and Company, took on the challenge. We'll look at the many characters in Paris at the time and particularly the important role women played in the incredible story of *Ulysses'* publication. Two sessions of lecture and questions will be followed by a screening and discussion of the new documentary *Left Bank: The Women Who Rescued James Joyce's Ulysses*, led by the director Lisa Reznik. *Left Bank* tells the largely unknown story of the pioneering women who helped shape and publish *Ulysses* when censorship laws prevented publication of Joyce's masterpiece. Thanks to their belief in Joyce's genius, *Ulysses* became a best-selling international classic and a triumph of modernist literature. NOTE: There is no need to have read *Ulysses* to enjoy these sessions. But if you want to give it a try...

Kathleen Dixon Donnelly's Ph.D. dissertation, "Such Friends," was on early 20th century writers' salons. She now blogs about them at www.suchfriends.wordpress.com. Kathleen recently retired from Birmingham [UK] City University to relocate to her hometown of Pittsburgh, PA.

412F / 412Z Pondering Poe's Fingerprints: From Murders in Rue Morgue to the Modern Detective Novel

Before Sherlock Holmes, there was C. Auguste Dupin, Edgar Allan Poe's brilliant blueprint for the modern detective. This course examines the origins of modern detective fiction through a close study of two of Edgar Allan Poe's short detective stories, *The Murders in the Rue Morgue* and *The Purloined Letter*, featuring his pioneering detective, Dupin. With the creation of Dupin, Poe establishes a set of conventions that have shaped detective fiction ever since. Students will explore foundational motifs such as the locked room mystery, the crucial clue hidden in plain sight, rigorous logical deduction, the use of red herrings, and the recurring figure of the incompetent police. By analyzing Poe's formal innovations and narrative strategies, we'll discuss how these elements became central to later detective and mystery writing. We'll complete our study by examining

modern-day examples of Poe's techniques in Dashiell Hammett's *The Maltese Falcon* and Ruth Ware's *The Woman in Cabin 10*.

Marilyn Harriman is a retired Fairfax County Advanced Placement language and composition instructor. She also taught HS and college English and journalism in Oregon, Texas, and Germany. She holds an MEd from the University of Virginia and BA degrees in English and Journalism from the University of Oregon.

413Z Feast of All Fools: *The Iceman Cometh* and Tragic Ambiguity

Eugene O'Neill's play, *The Iceman Cometh* contends with *Long Day's Journey Into Night* for the title of the greatest play ever written by an American, and to which the nod goes is a matter of debate. *Iceman* started the great creative burst of O'Neill's final four plays. It creates a very modern tragedy as it dissects the "pipe dreams" of the denizens of Harry Hope's saloon, asking whether their illusions condemn them to tragedy or protect them from despair. O'Neill creates one of the greatest characters in all of Western drama—the glad-handing salesman and would-be savior, Hickey—who attempts to destroy these pipe dreams without realizing the tragic cost. We will view and examine the play in detail to see how O'Neill created this masterpiece of the modern stage.

Charles Chadwick has an MA in Literature and has taught courses on the plays of Shakespeare, O'Neill, and Edward Albee for OLLI since 2014, as well as courses on poetry and contemporary literature. He is retired after a career in organizational ethics and as an executive in government contracting.

414Z *Dr. Strangelove*, or I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb

One session

Monday, 2:15–3:40, Oct. 5

Film director Stanley Kubrick's *Dr. Strangelove* is considered to be one of the greatest black comedies and political satires in film history. This romp through the absurdities of Cold War rhetoric and nuclear brinksmanship shocked and thrilled audiences of the time. Many of its characters are embedded in the public consciousness, including George C. Scott as General Buck Turgidson, Sterling Hayden as General Ripper, Slim Pickens as Major Kong, and Peter Sellers as the president, British officer Mandrake, and the infamous mad scientist Dr. Strangelove. The presenter will provide an overview of the movie's making, how it satirized Cold War fears of nuclear holocaust, and why it has stood the test of time. Various clips from the movie will be shown to demonstrate issues and to highlight performances. Sufficient time will be allowed for attendees to share their insights, favorite lines, and performances from the film.

Michael Mason retired in 2019 after 33 years with the U.S. EPA. Michael has given multiple lectures for OLLI on literature and environmental history. He is the co-coordinator for the OLLI Classic Literature and Family History clubs. Michael writes political satire for OLLI's Writers' Workshop.

415F Why 1984 Still Matters: Revisiting Orwell in Modern America

George Orwell's *1984* remains one of the most important novels of the 20th century. In this course, we will revisit key passages and themes—such as surveillance, language, truth, and individual freedom—and consider how they resonate today. Through guided discussion, short readings, and selected video clips, participants will explore connections between Orwell's fictional world and contemporary American life. In a welcoming and engaging setting of thoughtful conversation, this course emphasizes inquiry over conclusion, inviting multiple perspectives in a respectful, nonpartisan setting.

Ron Shapiro, an award-winning teacher, has published over 20 poems in publications including *Nova Bards 24 & 25*, *Virginia Writers Project*, *The New Verse News*, *Poetry X Hunger*, *Gezer Kibbutz Gallery* and *Paper Cranes Literary* magazine. *Understory* is his book of published nature poetry.

In this engaging author talk, suspense novelist Melinda Crocker shares her journey to becoming a published writer and the creative process behind crafting compelling mystery stories. Participants will learn how a simple idea can grow into a full novel, using examples from her latest book, *Behind Closed Lies*. Crocker discusses where story ideas come from, how writers develop believable characters, and why character growth—known as a character arc—is essential to keeping readers invested. She will also explore two common approaches to writing: planning with an outline versus "writing by the seat of your pants," and explain how she blends the two methods in her own work. Through examples from her novels and

insights from her publishing experience, students will gain a clearer understanding of how stories are built from concept to finished book. The session concludes with an interactive Q&A where participants can ask questions about writing, publishing, and the creative process.

Melinda Crocker is the author of five suspenseful mystery novels, including *Behind Closed Lies*, *Killing Spring*, and *The Truth About Autumn*. Known for vivid characters and emotional twists, she writes stories that immerse readers in gripping mysteries. A native Texan, she lives in Fairfax, Virginia.

418Z Beauty, Wisdom, and Worldviews in Classical Chinese Poetry

Inspired to begin an intense study of Japanese classical literature after returning home, she immersed herself in the works of the most famous Japanese poets, especially Matsuo Basho. This led her to her own poetic experiments and ultimately a book of haiku, illustrated by Berkeley, California artist, Janine Johnson (*101 Haiku: A Journey Through the Seasons*). This class will follow the author's journey: her experiences in Japan, and how the study of its arts, culture, aesthetics, literature, and religion became a springboard into a new appreciation of poetry, as well as a new way of experiencing life.

Dr. Vera Kochanowsky is an early music specialist, harpsichordist, teacher, and author residing in Falls Church, Virginia. She has performed in OLLI's *Meet the Artist* series and offered OLLI lectures about her two previous books, *Lenin, Hitler,*

and Me and *Anna and Boris: The Love Letters (1944-1946)*. *101 Haiku* is her first book of poetry.

Across cultures and historical periods, human societies consistently identify and reuse places shaped by four recurring forces—elemental landscapes (mountains, springs, rivers, and caves), celestial alignments (solar, lunar, and stellar orientation), ancestral presence (tombs, relics, and memorials), and threshold spaces (borders, crossings, and ritual boundaries). These “sacred gravities” help explain why places such as Jerusalem, Mecca, Delphi, Varanasi, Chartres, Angkor, and Mount Kailash remain spiritually potent long after origin.

Edward Ingebreetsen holds advance degrees in Theology and Ethics (JSTB 1982) and a Doctorate in American Studies/Theology (Duke 1986). His publications (books, journals) consider the intersection of gender, race, theology, and popular cultures. He specializes in non-human animal ethics.

Within the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures there is a clear development of thoughts concerning the Divine. God is spoken of, revealed, and understood very differently as the scriptures progress. The anthropomorphisms used for God in the Hebrew Scriptures oftentimes create problems in the current understanding of God. In medieval Christian theology, dogma and doctrine present ideas about God which the modern thinker knows simply cannot be known or understood and are not scriptural. Many of the ideas about God come from a philosophical absolutist view of what God must be like. This too is rejected today. In a more modern understanding, God is not a person. God is the source of all being. God is ineffable, and this is readily acknowledged, but theologians continue to define God in terms which are simply unacceptable to modern thought. Let's look at some of the new thought about the old God.

When you can pay \$1.99 a minute to talk to AI Jesus, it becomes clear that people of the Book (Bible) must take a closer look at whether artificial intelligence (AI) is just another tool or is an alternate or replacement worldview. Unknown to many casual observers of AI is that several of the founders and current promoters of AI see it as a replacement worldview or new way of understanding reality itself. This course will look and listen to what AI-evangelists say they expect from AI and compare that to five specific purposes identified in Biblical passages. This will include the topics of work, justice/mercy, family/human community, knowledge/wisdom, and communion with God. The course is premised on the Protestant Bible but will also include points from the Hebrew, Catholic, and Orthodox Bibles. Class participants do not need to have any faith, only a willingness to make an honest assessment of whether AI aligns or doesn't with Biblical scripture.

Karen Wheelless has spent over a decade teaching both graduates and undergraduates in organizational behavior, writing, marketing, and IT policy and planning at several universities. Prior to teaching, she spent a career as a civil service executive at multiple federal agencies.

We will talk about conspiracy influencers of our time and why people buy into what they are selling. We will also discuss some past and recent secret societies and hate groups on the internet and the vast number of followers of these groups. Then we will delve into some cults in our society and further discuss why so many people join them. Class participants are encouraged to bring their tin hats and conspiracy theories to class since it will be impossible for the instructor to cover every conspiracy theory.

Lillian Brooks earned her Juris Doctor at Atlanta Law school in Atlanta, Georgia and attended Master's level classes in Public Policy at George Mason University. She began her legal career practicing criminal law before transitioning to family law in Georgia. In Virginia, Lillian was appointed director of Court

Services for Alexandria Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court. She managed probation and parole and family law matters and programs. She also served as a commissioner on the board of the Regional Detention Home and Shelter care facilities and has published several articles on juvenile justice reform. She is a former president of OLLI and currently serves as an adjunct professor at George Mason University.

In this TED Talk-style course, we will explore great societies and civilizations, past and present. Using examples from classic founding civilizations such as the Roman and Mayan empires (as well as lesser-known groups such as the Minoans), students will learn to identify factors that contribute to the success and collapse of a society. At the end of each session, students are invited to discuss their views and questions on the topics covered. Sessions covered will be: 1) The Resilience Framework; 2) Case Studies in Resilient Civilizations; and 3) Civilization Resilience Index for Modern Civilizations (post-1945). Upon completing the course, students will be able to identify resilient past and current civilizations, enumerate reasons for their success and failure, and compare and contrast current and past civilizations using the Civilization Resilience Index.

Mr. van Ek is a principal at a Washington, D.C. based High Reliability think tank and has a strong background in strategic consulting across multiple industries. During the North Korean famine of the late 90s, the presenter worked with a team of colleagues from six non-profit organizations. The work was to carry out project assessments and to monitor the distribution of U.S. government-provided food commodities through 152 food-for-work projects throughout North Korea. This job entailed repeated contact with as many as 300 North Korean senior officials. Did the food commodities reach the affected populations? How controlled were the team's movements in the field and in Pyongyang? And what types of relationships were built with the instructor's North Korean "minders" and other officials encountered in the field? The presenter will show photos that she took during her time in North Korea including photos of people she met during her travels, propaganda signs, mass games, museums, Panmunjom, mountain landscapes, and many others!

Christy Gavitt was a Peace Corps volunteer in South Korea from 1974-76. She then worked overseas in international relief and development programs for 32 years, mostly in East Africa. From 2008, she worked for over five years as the senior health coordinator at the American Red Cross.

In 1991, the Soviet Union ended. The Cold War, the long struggle between Russia and the West, was over and we

had won! We thought. Today Russian troops are on the ground in Ukraine in perhaps the most visible attempt to spread Russian power, but there are many other ways that Russia still wages war against the West. "Active measures" from the Cold War days are active again: they include covert and deniable overseas operations (including assassinations), disinformation campaigns, and funding for friendly political movements. Sabotage against Western countries include blowing up rail lines in Poland, setting fire to a warehouse in London, and severing communications and power cables under the Baltic Sea. There are cyberattacks against Western countries and invasion of national boundaries by drones. Intelligence sources also report foiling a Russian plot to plant incendiary devices on planes flying from Europe to the United States. This class will exam Russia's continuing wars on the West.

of Gaza, and Palestinian refugee rights. This session will provide a brief historic overview and a summary of most recent political and humanitarian initiatives affecting both parties to the conflict and outside interests. It will concentrate on security concerns for both Palestinians and Israelis, urgent humanitarian needs in Gaza, and the role(s) of outside mediators, political interests, and options for Gaza reconstruction. It will conclude with a set of recommendations intended to help reduce human suffering and address impediments to conflict resolution.

Jim Bever retired from USAID Senior Foreign Service. His stellar career included assignments as mission director in the West Bank and Gaza (WB&G) and in Egypt. National economics often go through four stages, from hunters and gatherers to agriculture, to manufacturing, and to information. The United States is increasingly an information-based economy where individuals are being employed in one capacity or another to work with information. Information often has a spatial component or association which is basically the science of geography. This course will review the various components of locational geography as a science. It will focus specifically on current technical geography which is primarily cartography, Geographic Information Systems, Global Positioning Systems, spatial statistics, and remote sensing. The average American will have anesthesia care every eight to ten years, fewer when young and more when older. Many people have upcoming surgery or procedures planned and may be curious about anesthesia. Some have had anesthesia and have questions as to what was done and why. This course will explain the different types of anesthesia available (general, spinal, epidural, sedation, nerve block) and will have a few words to say about common surgical procedures.

Jonathan Roth is a retired anesthesiologist who was an associate professor at Temple and Jefferson Medical Schools in Philadelphia and served as chairman for eight years. In addition to clinical care, he conducted research (with over 150 publications) and taught anesthesia trainees.

807F Chromosomes, DNA and Genes–Simplified

Four sessions

Instructor: Suresh Mohla

Mondays, 11:50–1:15, Oct. 19–Nov. 9

This course explains what cells are and where our DNA is stored inside the cell's nucleus. You will learn that the nucleus is the seat for chromosomes, DNA, and genes, and that only our genes are "coded" to make proteins that keep our bodies working. We will discover that 98% of our DNA, which cannot make proteins and are often dubbed "Junk DNA", is anything but junk. Fifty percent of the junk DNA contains ancient viral gene segments inherited hundreds of millions of years ago which are crucial for our genes to function optimally. These viral DNA fossils control how our genes behave when we are healthy, but they also control how genes change—causing discomfort as we age, and in chronic diseases. Finally, we will appreciate how this knowledge is being exploited to improve diagnosis and treatment in human pathologies. Understanding your genes is becoming essential for modern, personalized health care.

Suresh Mohla, an endocrinologist, did his post-doctoral training at the University of Chicago. He has 45 years of

experience in cancer research including 25 years at the National Cancer Institute. He has taught courses on topics including cancer, aging, chronic diseases, microbiome, and viruses in our DNA.

808F / 808Z Medical Imaging Methods and Applications

Two sessions

Instructor: Murray Loew

Mondays, 2:15–3:40, Oct. 19–Oct. 26

When you have an imaging exam, such as x-ray, computerized tomography (CT), magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), or ultrasound, what is actually happening? This nontechnical class introduces the underlying technologies and how they have developed since Roentgen's discovery of x-rays in 1895. We now can image both the form and the function of much of our anatomy and physiology (often in real-time), which has led to improved diagnosis and treatment. In recent years there have been great advances in speed, sensitivity, and accuracy, and reductions in radiation dose and cost. Specialized imaging methods (e.g., PET, nuclear medicine, interventional radiology) are also discussed, along with their applications to cancer treatment, vascular therapies, surgery, and Alzheimer's disease.

Murray Loew, Ph.D., is an OLLI member and a retired professor of Biomedical Engineering at George Washington University. He has had extensive research experience and collaborations with clinicians and scientists at GW, NIH, and the FDA across the range of imaging modalities and applications.

809R Behind the Prize...Nobel, That Is

It's all about Alfred Nobel, the inventor of dynamite, and the quirky characters who won, hands down, the most coveted prize on planet earth. We will start with Big Al as I like to call him, and how the prize came to be. It reads like a soap opera. Who is eligible for the prize, what are the rules and who decides? It's all spelled out in his will. The youngest recipient was 17 and the oldest 97. Three were dead and three were in the slammer. The awards ceremony itself is choreographed right down to the dress code. We will look back at some of the more colorful recipients and talk a whole lot of trash. Many people deserved a Nobel and never got it. There were also a great many who were nominated and never should have been. It's quite a unique group. There are steps that you need to take in order to win a Nobel (spoiler alert: being born a white male is a major advantage). We will finish with a round of Nobel Jeopardy, not to be missed.

810F From Lab to Life: Virtual Reality to Manage Craving Reactivity and Reduce Substance Use

The instructor's work expands on the well-researched drug cue-craving paradigm that suggests exposure to drug cues changes the brain and body in ways that increase craving and relapse risk. The research empirically examines if "recovery cues"—or personalized sensory stimuli associated with recovery—hold promise in helping regulate craving reaction to reduce relapse risk. Immersive virtual reality (VR) environments can be used to examine this research question, as VR simulations can build recovery skills before implementing those skills in real-world situations. In doing so, individuals can gain experience with their recovery cues and skill implementation successes during the VR training. Using their own VR-trained skills, they can then use this experience outside the lab to guide real-world behavioral decision-making to prevent substance use relapse. Thus, VR can serve as a learning space to facilitate lab-to-life recovery skills transfer.

Holly Matto, Ph.D., LCSW-C is a professor in the Department of Social Work in the College of Public Health at George Mason University. She has over 20 years of experience in the field of addiction science and has conducted treatment intervention studies with a variety of clinical populations.

811F Preventing Fraud and Abuse in the Medicare System

Medicare fraud is a multibillion-dollar crisis that affects every taxpayer. This session will expose the most dangerous healthcare scams. From genetic testing and fake durable medical equipment schemes to government imposter scams, these fraudulent practices threaten the integrity of our healthcare system and raise costs for everyone. Participants will gain knowledge on how to recognize common scams, understand their impact, and take steps to prevent becoming a victim. The course highlights how to detect suspicious activity on medical statements and provides guidance on how to report fraud. Whether you're a current Medicare beneficiary, a caregiver, a healthcare professional, or simply preparing for enrollment in the future, this session will provide the tools needed to protect yourself. Medicare fraud costs taxpayers over \$60 billion annually. Beyond financial damage, these scams can lead to stolen medical identities, false diagnoses, and denied treatments.

Martin Bailey is an AARP Community Ambassador and a senior educator with Virginia's Senior Medicare Patrol, specializing in fraud. He brings extensive experience from years of fraud-focused presentations on the psychology of scams, social engineering, and artificial intelligence.

812R Depression in Older Adults: Diagnosis and Treatment

This class will cover the diagnosis of clinical depression, the different types of depression, and the causes of depression, including the special circumstances of how depression relates to loneliness, bereavement, and dementia. We will then discuss pharmacologic, psychotherapeutic, and other treatments for depression. In addition, we will address the difference between clinical depression and “normal human misery”. Class discussion will be encouraged as time allows.

Dr. Jonathan Bauman is a board-certified general psychiatrist who treated adolescent and adult patients for 42 years until retiring in 2019. He is a graduate of Georgetown University School of Medicine and completed his residency at Georgetown in 1977. He is a life fellow of the American Psychiatric Association.

813F Chasing the Data: How Climate Change is Reshaping Our Storms

We all experience weather in our daily lives. However, as carbon dioxide levels and global temperatures have risen over recent decades, a critical question remains as to how this warming is changing the storms we experience. This course explores how global warming has created a “tug of war” of competing effects that influence these storms, including Arctic Amplification, an expanding tropical circulation as well as increased atmospheric moisture, which all shape extratropical cyclones across North America, Europe, and the Pacific and Asian coastlines. This talk aims to discern the role moisture plays on the dynamics of Atlantic versus Pacific storms, and how this feedback can give insight into how these storms are changing despite these competing effects. Emphasis will be placed on implications for future prediction of storm frequency and strength in the Northern Hemisphere. An interactive jeopardy game will follow, focused on global warming causes, impacts, and extreme weather.

Austin T. Reed is a current Ph.D. candidate in Climate Dynamics at George Mason University, expected to defend his thesis in Summer 2026. His thesis examines the changing role of moisture within Extratropical cyclones in the Atlantic and Pacific storm tracks.

Sept. 21: From Surfer Girl to Good Vibrations: The Beach Boys and the Birth of the Sonic Layer. Mike Agron.

In 1961, three brothers, a cousin, and a friend turned a garage band into a sonic revolution. Led by Brian Wilson, The Beach Boys fused doo-wop and jazz harmony, using voices as instruments to create the “sonic layer.” From the innocence of “Surfer Girl” to the innovation of “Good Vibrations,” hear how their sound evolved—and still shapes music today.

A music aficionado raised in LA’s entertainment scene **Mike Agron** now lives in Sacramento, CA. He’s a former high-tech executive and entrepreneur turned storyteller. Mike creates engaging multimedia seminars on music and film and has led hundreds of seminars for the Sacramento Renaissance Society, multiple OLLIs nationwide, and Osher Online. He returns to OLLI Mason for his fifth Monday lecture.

Sept. 28: The Mediterranean in a Post-Atlantic World. John Koenig.

The Mediterranean is a powerful symbol, conjuring vivid images of historic battles, cultural monuments, and holiday revelry. The historian David Abulafia has called it “The Great Sea”. No body of water has so impressed itself on our minds. But what has the Mediterranean been as a geopolitical space? Historically, in that sense, the character of the Mediterranean has shifted dramatically over time, from center to periphery, from bridge to bulwark, and from battlefield to backwater. Since the end of the Cold War, the long era of Atlantic domination in world affairs has drawn to a close after more than three centuries. More recently, the broad Atlantic Alliance has faltered. What is the Mediterranean’s place in the emerging post-Atlantic world, as NATO and the broader Atlantic alliance stumble and even collapse? Will the Mediterranean develop as an integrated geopolitical space or remain a neglected backwater? Will it be characterized by regional and strategic confrontation or cooperation? How will Europe and the European Union regard the Sea—as a defensive moat and arena of “great power rivalry”, or a field for economic and security engagement and opportunity? In this lecture, the instructor will draw on more than three decades of professional and personal experience with the Mediterranean to review its history as a Geopolitical Space, consider recent developments, and sketch out alternative futures for what remains “The Great Sea”.

John M. Koenig has taught at the University of Washington’s Jackson School of International Studies since 2017 and has led the school’s program in Rome. An American diplomat for more than thirty years, Koenig was ambassador to Cyprus from 2012 to 2015. From 2006 to 2009, he was deputy chief of mission and charge d’Affaires in Berlin. He was deputy U.S. permanent

representative to NATO in Brussels from 2003 to 2006, and, from 2009 to 2012, political advisor to NATO Joint Forces Command Naples. Earlier in his career, Koenig served six years in Greece (both Athens and Thessaloniki) and three more years in Cyprus. During the Cold War, Koenig was a political officer at the American embassy to East Germany.

Oct. 5: Why is the Resurgence of Nuclear Power so Crucial? Can the Current Efforts Succeed? Shivaji (Shiv) Seth.

The demand for energy is dramatically rising, driven by digital data centers, artificial intelligence, manufacturing, and electrification. It is placing a premium on carbon-free energy to prevent global warming and climate change. High-technology and many other industries prefer clean energy, despite the government denying climate change, encouraging fossil fuels, and removing support for solar and wind energy. The latter alone simply cannot meet such rising energy demands. Meanwhile, the nuclear industry is staging a resurgence of carbon-free nuclear power with small reactors, but those are 5-10 years away to be available commercially. Also, the historical cost over-runs and delays with large nuclear plant construction are serious concerns that stalled the growth of nuclear power. Can we meet both: the growing energy needs and climate challenges? This class will discuss the status and address the issue.

Shivaji (Shiv) Seth was in the energy field throughout his 60-year career in industry and in senior advisory roles with government. He has lectured on energy and global warming. Dr. Seth has a Ph.D. in Nuclear Engineering from MIT, and is an emeritus member of the American Nuclear Society.

Oct. 19: Body Farm. Mary Ellen O'Toole. This session will be an overview of George Mason University's Forensic Science Research and Training Laboratory (FSRTL), otherwise known as the Body Farm. One of eight body farms in the United States, and the only one in the mid-Atlantic region, the instructor will discuss the importance and relevance of research conducted at the Body Farm, the incredible value of the training for GMU forensic students, and the global humanitarian impact of this work in the location and identification of human remains for reunification with their loved ones. The study of human remains and human decomposition can assist in homicide investigations and the instructor will discuss several major cases on which she worked while with the FBI.

Mary Ellen O'Toole is currently a full professor and the director of the Forensic Science Program at George Mason University and has served in this position for over eleven years. Prior to arriving at Mason, Dr. O'Toole served as a supervisory special agent with the FBI for nearly 28 years and for 15 years as an FBI profiler. She worked on some of the Bureau's most high profile cases including the Green River serial killer case, the Unabomber case, the Elizabeth Smart case, and the Natalie Holloway case.

Oct. 26: Religious Beliefs of the Founders.

Heather Dudley. This course explores the religious beliefs of a selection of America's Founding Fathers, including George Washington, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, and Benjamin Franklin. By examining the diverse spiritual views of these key figures, the course aims to provide a clearer understanding of the founders'



intentions regarding the role of religion in the new nation. This exploration is especially relevant today, in light of the rise of Christian nationalism—a movement that claims the United States was established as a Christian nation and that its laws and government should reflect Christian principles.

Heather Dudley taught at the high school and college level. She has an MA in History, an MA in Psychology, and a Doctorate from Georgetown University. She writes a blog—charactermattered.org—and is the author of a book on the founders, *The Free and the Virtuous: Why the Founders Knew that Character Mattered*.

Nov. 2: Exploring Opera: Popular Paris. James Sokol.

Such a beautiful, romantic, historic city, it's no wonder Paris is a popular setting for several operas! Embark on an operatic journey to Paris with the instructor, who will touch on an array of repertoire from beloved masterpieces (such as Puccini's *La Boheme* and Verdi's *La Traviata*) to rarely-staged gems (such as Meyerbeer's *Les Huguenots* and Donizetti's *Ugo, Conte di Parigi*)—each set in “The City of Light!” Audio and video performance clips bring the charm of Paris and the excitement of opera into the discussion! This is a fun and interesting exploration for both opera newcomers and long-time fans!

James Sokol started in the opera world under Beverly Sills at New York City Opera. After working on projects with the Opera Company of Philadelphia while in graduate school, Sokol moved west to work at San Francisco Opera. He is a former executive director of Pocket Opera and a founding member of the Singers Development Foundation.

1006E Walking with Washington: A Journey Through Historic Pohick Church

Get an up-close look at George Washington's historic Pohick Church, which he and fellow vestrymen George Mason and George William Fairfax built. Because of its proximity to the highest point of land in the area, the founding fathers chose the parish site to reflect the Biblical image of a "city upon a hill" that could not be hidden. Also known as the Mother Church of Northern Virginia, the parish is still active today and is located on Richmond Highway in Lorton. During colonial times, the church served as a place of worship and a social gathering for Washington and his family, as well as community members in the region. During the tour, a docent will discuss and point out the church's architecture and its use during colonial times, the War of 1812, and the Civil War. You'll have an opportunity to sit in the box pews where Washington and Mason, as well as other prominent members of the time, sat. and exchange traded funds, real estate investment trusts, sector allocations, investment strategies, portfolio management, and choosing advisory services. Each week members may participate in our "Buy/Sell/Thinking-About" segment by sharing their investment trades or activities of the previous week, which are then looked at and discussed in a peer group setting. The Forum typically uses various Wall Street analyses and data, as well as relevant news from the financial press. In addition, we regularly incorporate a number of online financial tools and websites in looking at members' recent trading activities or other investment products.

Two Types of OLLI Mason Membership

Memberships at OLLI Mason can be purchased at any time during the year and are renewed on a rolling basis.

- **Annual membership.** Register for unlimited courses and activities for four consecutive terms. Members are eligible for a Mason ID card to receive certain university privileges and discounts (see page ii). The cost is **\$450**.
- **Introductory membership.** Register for unlimited courses and activities for just one term, one time only. An introductory membership is not available to former OLLI Mason members; it is intended for new members who want to sample OLLI Mason before committing to a full year. Introductory members are not eligible for a Mason ID card or its privileges. The **onetime** introductory membership is **\$150**.

The term date on your catalog mailing label reflects the end of your current membership. If it is time to renew, you may not be able to view offerings or register on the Member Portal until you purchase your membership renewal.
